The story of Macbeth begins with the Kingdom of Scotland in chaos. There is a rebellion in the west and invasion in the east. In the west a great warrior called Macbeth, the Thane of Glamis, leads the Scottish army and his bravery and skill destroys the enemy. He then rides across the country to the other battle and with his mighty sword he drives the enemy off. It's as if one man has won both World War I and World War II single-handed and on the same day.

After the battles Macbeth and his best friend, Banquo [also a great warrior] are riding back to see King Duncan. Macbeth is feeling strange.

So foul and fair a day I have not seen.

Act 1 Sc iii

Three weird sisters appear in front of them and greet Macbeth. They say that he will be promoted to Thane of Cawdor and also greet him with the words:

Witches

All hail Macbeth! That shall be King hereafter.

Act 1 Sc iii

They also tell Banquo his children shall be king, though he himself will never be.

The pair are soon greeted by messengers from the king who tell Macbeth that he has been promoted to Thane of Cawdor. Macbeth and Banquo are surprised. They soon reach the king and he thanks them both for their service in saving the kingdom. He then names his successor:

King Duncan

Our eldest, Malcolm; whom we name hereafter
The Prince of Cumberland.

Act 1 Sc iv

Macbeth is begins to be consumed with the desire to be king, but he tries to conceal it.

Stars, hide your fires!
Let not light see my black and deep desires

Act 1 Sc v

King Duncan honours Macbeth by announcing that he will visit Macbeth's castle. Macbeth sends a letter to his wife telling her all that has happened. Lady Macbeth decides to help her husband become king, but she isn't sure that either of them are strong enough to murder the king and take the crown by force. So she summons up evil spirits to make her able to do what is required:

Lady Macbeth

Fill me from the crown to the toe, top-full of direst cruelty!

Act 1 Sc vii

Macbeth arrives home and having thought through the consequences of killing King Duncan he decides they had better not, but Lady Macbeth will not hear of this and she criticises Macbeth for being a coward.

We will proceed no further in this business.

Lady Macbeth

Art thou afeared?

Act 1 Sc vii

Agreeing to carry out the murder his wife has set up for him to do, Macbeth sees a dagger pointing towards King Duncan's room - guiding him to the murder.

Is this a dagger, which I see before me?

Act 2 Sc i

After committing the terrible crime Macbeth is instantly sorry and full of regret.

To know my deed,
'twere best not know
myself.

Act 2 Sc ii

However his wife refuses to let him wallow in guilt and demands he try to cover up his crime.

When Macduff, The Thane of Fife, tries to wake up the king in the morning he discovers the scene of the crime and with his shocked cries he wakes up the whole castle.

Macduff

Awake! Awake!
Ring the alarum bell.
Murder and treason!

Act 2 Sc iii

King Duncan's sons, Malcolm and Donalbain, fear that they will be murdered by whoever murdered their father so they flee. This makes people suspect they might have murdered their own father. Everyone is upset at King Duncan's violent death, and, since the war was so recent, they decide to make Macbeth king. The witches prophesy has come true.

But, even though he is King,
Macbeth isn't satisfied. He feels
guilty about having killed King
Duncan and worried that someone
will take the crown from him.

To be thus is nothing, But to be safely thus.

Act 3 Sc i

Lady Macbeth sees
that he is suffering and
tries to help him forget
the past but Macbeth
can't help it.

Lady Macbeth

Why do you keep alone?...What's done is done.

Macbeth

Full of scorpions is my mind, dear wife!

Act 3 Sc ii

Macbeth remembers that the witches predicted Banquo's children would become kings. He sends three murderers to kill Banquo and his son Fleance.

Banquo

O treachery! Fly good Fleance, fly, fly, fly!

Act 3 Sc iii

Fleance escapes the ambush and Macbeth is still worried. Soon after Banquo's death Macbeth is having a big dinner with all the important people of Scotland. Banquo's blood covered ghost appears and Macbeth is very frightened.

Never shake thy gory locks at me.

Act 3 Sc iv

No one else can see the ghost and they think that Macbeth is unstable and suspicious. He seeks out the witches for more advice. The witches give him three prophesies.

Witches

Beware the Thane of Fife...

None of woman born shall harm

Macbeth...

Macbeth shall never vanquished be,

until Great Birnum Wood

to high Dunsinane hill shall come

Macbeth

against him

That will never be

Act 4 Sc i

Macbeth feels safe now that he knows no man born of woman can harm him and that he is safe ntil Birnum Wood comes to Dunsinane castle. But since the witches warned him about Macduff he decides to kill him and his family anyway.

He sends his murderers to Macduff's house, but Macduff is away in England so while they cannot kill Macduff, they do murder his whole family.

Macduff's Son

He hath kill'd me mother.

Act 4 Sc ii

Macduff has gone to England to find King Duncan's son, Malcolm. They agree to rise up against the murderous Macbeth and return Malcolm, the true king, to the throne of Scotland. Just then a messenger arrives to tell Macduff of Macbeth's latest crime.

Macduff He has no children. All my pretty ones? Did you say all?

Act 4 Sc iii

Back in Scotland Lady Macbeth has gone mad with guilt over the murders of the King, Banquo and Macduff's wife and family. She imagines she has blood staining her hands.

Lady Macbeth

Out, damned spot!

Act 5 Sc i

Malcolm and Macduff's army marches towards Macbeth and, as they pass through Birnum Wood, Malcolm commands them to cut down a branch each to make it harder for the enemy to count how many soldiers they have.

Malcolm

Let every soldier hew him down a bough.

Act 5 Sc iv

As the army closes in on Macbeth, and his Thanes desert him to side with Malcolm, Lady Macbeth dies. Macbeth feels very sad and regrets that life has become so dark.

She should have died hereafter.

Act 5 Sc v

Still trusting in the witches prophecies Macbeth feels that he cannot be defeated, but then Malcolm's army comes over the hill carrying the branches of Birnum Wood and Macbeth starts to suspect the witches may have tricked him with their words.

Macduff corners Macbeth in his castle and Macbeth says he is protected from any man born of woman. Macduff replies that he wasn't born of woman.

Macduff

Macduff was from his mother's womb untimely ripped.

Act 5 Sc viii

Alone, tricked by the witches and trapped Macbeth decides to try and fight his way out.

Lay on Macduff and damned be him that first cries, "Hold enough!"

Act 5 Sc viii

Macduff beats Macbeth in single combat and everyone calls for Malcolm to be the new king.

All

Hail, King of Scotland!
